# A DOULA'S IMPACT: ENGAGING AND STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY









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#### What is a Community-Based Doula?

**Community** - a group of people living in the vicinity or having a particular characteristic in common; a feeling of fellowship with others as a result of sharing common attitudes, interests, goals, and culture.

**Based** -Rooted in culture and to have as the foundation for (something)

**Doula** - a person trained to provide empowerment, information, emotional support, and physical comfort to a mother before, during, and just after childbirth

**Community-Based Doula** - a trained peer well-versed in the community that they serve, who provides physical, emotional, and educational support in a culturally sensitive way.

#### Communty-Based Doulas

#### Independent doulas:

- May have their own practice
- May not provide culturally congruent care
- May not connect you with resource
- Often viewed as a "luxury"
  - not everyone can afford a doula

#### **Community-based doulas:**

- May work with an organization
- Provide culturally congruent care
- May provide you with community resources
- May have 20-plus prenatal touches
- Often from the same communities they are serving

## What else is different about community-based doulas?

- Community-based doulas provide continuous support to mothers during labor and delivery, helping them cope with the physical
  and mental demands of giving birth.
- Drawing on their specialized training and lived experience to guide birthing persons through labor and delivery, community-based doulas provide emotional support and physical comfort that enhance the childbirth experience for the entire family.
- They also work with medical staff, including doctors, midwives, and nurses, to provide informational support to all birthing people they serve and help transition to parenthood.
- Community-based doulas have at least one commonality with the birthing person, which improves outcomes for under-resourced communities.
- They remove barriers by meeting families prenatally and postpartum in the home. In addition, community-based doulas address maternal health inequities and help create positive childbirth experiences and work towards improved birth and infant health outcomes.
- Community-based doula services are long-term, starting early pregnancy and continuing until six months postpartum.
- The pay source is also often different for community-based doulas. Funders invest in organizations that pay community-based doulas for the services. In some states, doula reimbursement covers the cost of community-based doula services.

#### Black women need doulas!





This is a national health crisis that must be addressed immediately. We believe that community-based doulas are a lifeline for these families and the missing link to addressing this critical issue.

#### The Why of Birth Matters in SC

- We want to reduce health/ racial disparities.
- Infant mortality for black babies is 2x higher than for white babies.
- Black babies are 1.5x more likely to be low birth weight than white babies.
- Mothers of color at 2-3X's more likely to die in childbirth or birth-related complications.





#### Birth Matters Results

- Fewer cesarean sections
- Fewer neonatal intensive care admissions
- Increased breastfeeding
- No infant mortality
- No maternal mortality




